




If you only want one book to assist your study of the Old Testament, then this is the one! Well set out, with plenty of graphics and time-lines to please the eye and help you picture what it is you are reading about. Knowledgeable and informative, the book successfully avoids the pitfalls of being too 'academic', but provides plenty of margin references for you to go direct to the biblical text being commented on. A first-rate study aid.



Introducing the New Testament.

This book by John Drane is a masterpiece. Drane approaches the subject from an evangelical christian point of view. He is not scared to examine points of view that he disagrees with, but at the same time he will let no current social convention come between himself and what he believes the text of the New Testament to actually mean. This book does not just cover the theology of the New Testament but also looks at the socio-political climate that the New Testament was written in and that the first christians lived in.




Ben's lecture explores the theme of transformation, ending with a call for us as Quakers to return to a transforming and transformational faith.






A Guide to True Peace - or The Excellency of Inward and Spiritual Prayer.




Portrait In Grey - a short history of Quakers.

I reckon this is the best and most precise volume of Quaker history. Every Friend should read this!




Christian Faith and Practice in the experience of the Society of Friends.




Journal of George Fox.






The World in my Heart.




George Fox and the Children of the Light.

George Fox and the Children of the Light is valuable as an illustration of the amazing religious ferment of the mid seventeenth century, when preachers like George Fox could attract huge crowds in market places and churchyards.


17th Century England was torn by political and social conflict. But against this background cacophony a firm, pure voice spoke out, denouncing the ostentations of the rich, and the stranglehold of the Church on people's lives, declaring that every person could communicate directly with God. Fox's preaching style was often uncompromising, but in his Journal the reader gets a strong sense of the passion and fortitude of a remarkable man struggling against the odds to get his message heard in a society that had little tolerance of dissent.



Joseph Rowntree.

The Rowntree name is linked to some of the most iconic and well-loved brands of the 20th century, including the KitKat, Aero and Fruit Pastilles. On the way he transformed a small factory in York into a global business. But there is much more to the Joseph Rowntree story than chocolate. 
Godless for God's Sake

God's Sake'.




A book of Quaker saints

John Punshon

Accounts of Quaker history written after about the middle of the twentieth century, and especially those covering Quakerism worldwide, seem to be a rare occurrence. Given this scarcity, Punshon is to be commended for attempting to fill the gap. He is clearly a Quaker himself, which adds relevance and insight into the ways in which the historical currents of the Society have influenced its form and practice. While not postured as such, this book might appropriately be called "a personal history of the Quakers" due to the tone and reluctance to present a strong thesis of any sort. The prosaic and structural difficulties make this a less than engaging read, but in an area with few alternatives, Punshon provides an adequate history of Quakerism for the curious.



In Fox's Footsteps

In Fox's Footsteps is the story of three adventurous journeys. The first is a fresh retelling, with much new material, of George Fox's walk in 1652 from Pendle Hill in Lancashire across the Yorkshire Dales to Swarthmoor in the deep south of England's Lake District. It is the journey by a troublesome missionary-agitator which saw the birth of a radical movement derisively called Quakersim which would permanently mark England's religious, political and social life.



Christopher Holdsworth






Broken for Life




The Secret Room






Preparing for Peace








Previous Convictions





This book is based on his experience of helping those carrying feelings of pain and anger. It speaks of hope, healing, forgiveness, and love in action.


